**• President's Report**

**Chancellor Melissa Aviles-Ramos Borough Tour Stop in December:**

- **Purpose:** Engage the Staten Island community to gather feedback on key topics: empowering families, equipping teachers, and student safety.
- **Discussion Questions:**
  - What does meaningful parent engagement mean to you?
  - How can schools better empower families?
  - What do teachers need to support students meaningfully?
  - What professional development can enhance teachers' work?
  - What safety or wellness concerns affect students, and how can schools address them?
- **Feedback and Observations from Roundtable gathering of Constituents :**
  - Students' emotional and physical safety remains a major concern.
  - Parents seek greater engagement and feel schools are not welcoming enough post-COVID.
  - Frequent call for in-person parent-teacher conferences.
  - Teachers are burned out and lack sufficient resources and professional development.
  - Administrative challenges in supporting staff due to workload constraints.
- **Council President's & Council Member Guido's Feedback:**
  - Found the forum's format to be unproductive, as it seemed to ask the community to solve recurring issues already well-known across boroughs.
  - Noted repeated concerns from various tables that align with systemic issues in NYC public schools.
  - Expectations were to engage directly with the Chancellor through questions and responses, but this did not happen.
  - Discussions at tables consistently repeated the same three points across groups, highlighting parent engagement as a primary concern.
  - Examples of inefficiencies, such as handwritten security logs, were mentioned but not meaningfully addressed.
  - The process involved aggregating input without immediate feedback from the Chancellor, reducing the forum's effectiveness.
  - Overall, the event was criticized as "political theater" rather than a meaningful engagement opportunity.

• **President's Report:**

**CEC Open Seats:**

Three parent representative seats and one English Language Learner parent representative seat are open on the Council. Applications are encouraged.

**NYC Public School Reading Curriculum Overhaul:**

In response to feedback from teachers and unions, Chancellor Melissa Avilles Ramos announced updates to the HMH reading curriculum, which was mandated for all elementary schools in September. The rollout has faced challenges, including teacher training and material procurement. While the teachers' union supports the changes, the principals' union criticized the initiative as rushed and lacking input. Educators raised concerns about the dense curriculum and lack of flexibility. New policies will provide teachers with more freedom and reduce administrative burdens. District 31's interim superintendent is working to address these concerns, incorporating feedback from council members.

**Suspensions:**

Principal suspensions dropped by over 3%, but longer superintendent suspensions increased by 1% to over 6,200. While suspension numbers remain below pre-pandemic levels, rates have returned to similar proportions due to declining student enrollment.

**AI Reading Tutor:**

New York City education officials withdrew a \$1.9 million AI-powered reading tutor proposal after concerns about student privacy and unclear policies were raised. The decision was postponed for further public feedback, despite the tool being used in schools for years.

**PEP Approval of Pearson Contract:**

New York City's education panel approved a five-year, \$17 million contract with Pearson to digitize the specialized high school admissions test. The decision followed months of deliberation and a Town Hall for public input, passing with 14 votes in favor and support from many Staten Island constituents.

**Class Size Reduction Update:**

New York City is offering additional funding to schools to reduce class sizes under state law, with plans due by December 20. The program is voluntary, allowing schools to design strategies with input from parents and staff. The goal is for 60% of classrooms to meet new size caps by 2025, with full compliance by 2028. Current class size caps range from 20 to

● **Public Speaking**

Dr. Darling James Miramey acknowledged the continued ELL support for students, children, and families. They highlight the upcoming election and emphasize the importance of the DOE expanding language support to include more languages, specifically mentioning Italian, which is covered at the state level but not yet by the DOE. They advocate for increased parental involvement and better communication with families in various languages, pointing out that the DOE's method for determining language support, which is reportedly based on census data, lacks transparency and clarity. The speaker stresses the need for communication to accommodate at least 12 languages identified through census findings and concludes with gratitude, expressing mutual appreciation for ongoing advocacy efforts.

Neil asked about the possibility of expanding the WAELS program at PS 84 to include middle and high school levels. It was clarified that there are currently no plans to continue the WAELS program into middle school. However, for the 2025-2026 plan, there is a proposal to implement a high school that combines elementary and high school education. This initiative involves relocating the TWILLS program from the building to an alternative space, allowing WAELS to fully utilize its capacity and enabling TWILLS to expand to high school without causing space issues. Updates from space planning, led by Tori Fenton, will be shared once a new space is identified, and the proposal undergoes approval with the CEC. The community will be kept informed as developments progress.

Dr. Cheryl McMillian expressed frustration about Staten Island being consistently placed last in events, asking why this happens. The response jokingly suggested it was because they saved the best for last. The conversation then shifted to a question about an upcoming virtual IEP workshop, which was confirmed as being held online. Lastly, there was a discussion about the NAACP's interest in identifying best practices from successful schools, with a request for advice on how the NAACP can better support schools and help children succeed.
